School Data: What parents say...

Challenges and Areas to Improve Upon for Distance Learning

- Students need more time with their teachers and more direct instruction
- Consistency across teachers and grade levels; standardized schedules and expectations for teachers
- Keeping students engaged and motivated
- Keeping up with the amount of work students received
- Supporting parents - increased burden, especially for working parents
- Managing and navigating various learning platforms
- Technology glitches/challenges
- Lack of opportunity for social interaction with peers
- Additional feedback on assignments

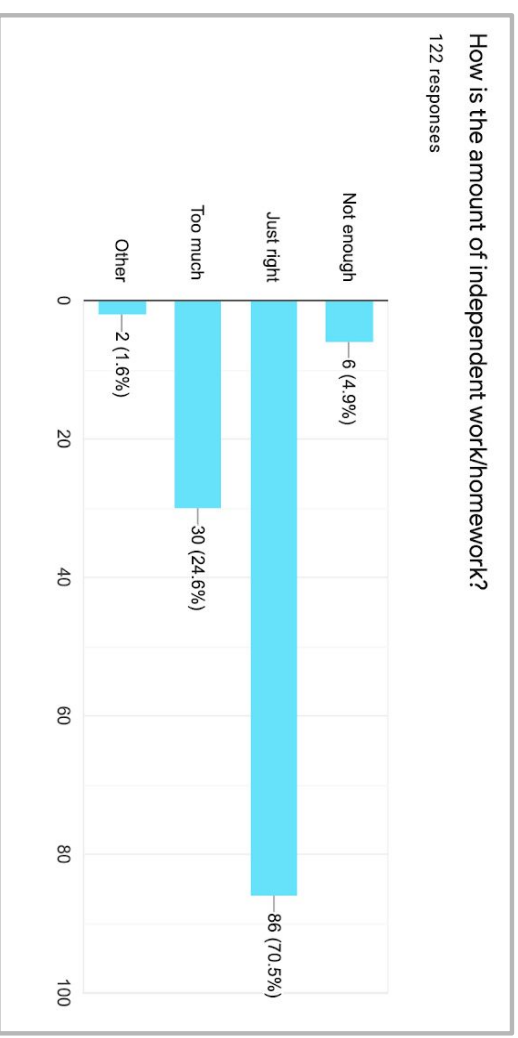
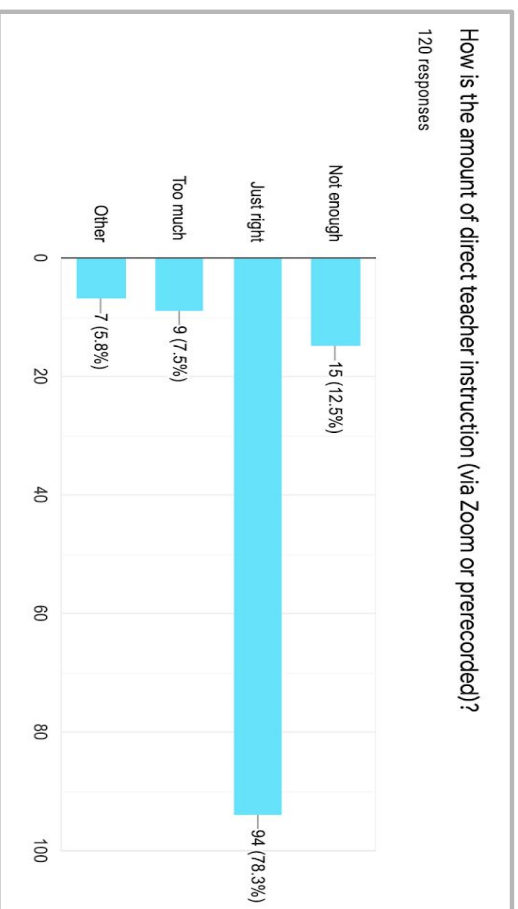

Student responses to spring survey* questions:



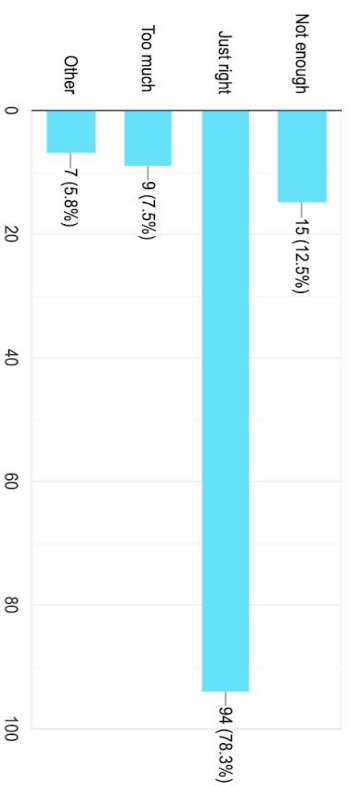

Student responses to spring survey* questions:

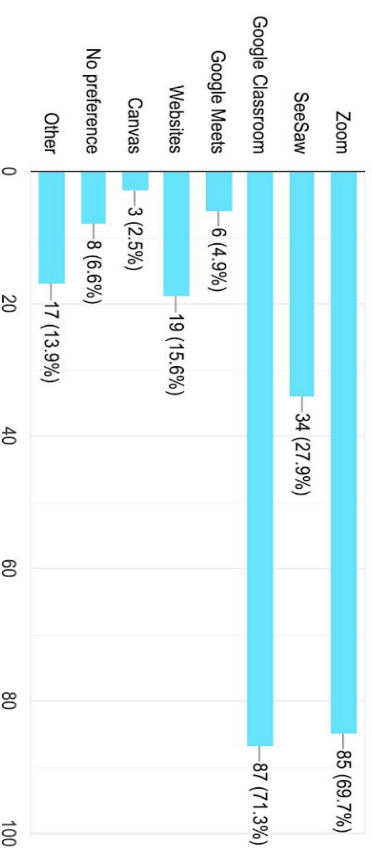
How is the amount of direct teacher instruction (via Zoom or prerecorded)?

Elementary School Data: What kids say...

"What things would be more helpful in your distance learning experience?"

During certain breakout groups, people sometimes disrupt each other and dwindle from the subject. I think that students should talk with the teacher before hand to be the host of that breakout group, eliminating any interrupters by merely muting them.

We could have a little longer time in the meetings like 34 minutes.

Well, my experience is pretty great. I like the idea of relaxing at home while learning! So It's pretty much perfection as it is. But the quick checks, quick every few days math homework that we do, would be much better if we found a way to show our work. So instead of just getting it wrong, we could figure out how we messed up and do better next time. And that's what math is all about, I think.

Nothing, currently doing fine as it is. Don't really need anything to change it, only problems with lag/technical difficulties during zoom but you can't really fix that.

Having more small group meetings will be helpful because I can learn better when I am with less people.

"What things are not as helpful in your distance learning experience?"

I think something that is not as helpful is that our teacher cannot help us as much as she usually does.

The technical difficulties.

Don't get to see our friends in person. :(

Sometimes glitches occur between different time periods. Also my teacher always gets kicked out of the meeting when he shares his screen. And also when other students talk, their voice gets choppy and hard to hear.

Breaking out zoom sessions into 30-40 minutes each instead of one long 1.5 session.

I really do not think that there is anything wrong with the distance learning experience.

Challenges and Areas to Improve Upon for Distance Learning

- Student attendance/participation
- Keeping students engaged and holding them accountable
- Technical issues
- Juggling all of the demands - teaching, creating lessons/content, supporting with technology, responding to emails
- Learning and implementing at the same time
- Supporting all learners
- Meeting the needs of all families and students - some wanted more of something, while others wanted less
- Assessing and monitoring students' progress

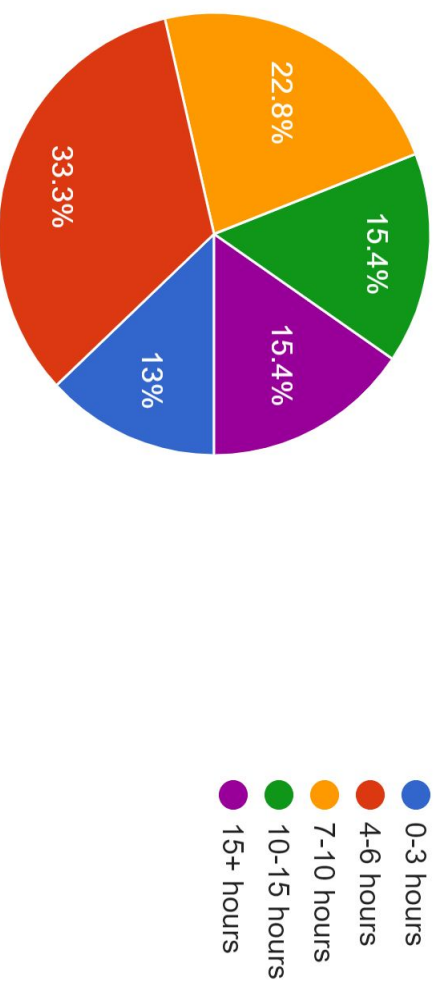
Successes and Helpful Components of Distance Learning

Responses	What activities helped you learn BEST in the past two months?
99 (82.5%)	We used Google Classroom
80 (66.7%)	Attending live Zoom sessions
51 (42.5%)	I received feedback/comments on my assignments from my teachers
50 (41.7%)	My teacher posted worksheets that I could complete online and submit
43 (35.8%)	My teacher posted videos of themselves that supported our lessons
42 (35%)	My teacher used web-based tools like flipgrid, Padlet, Kahoot, Quizlet, Imagine Learning, etc
40 (33.3%)	I attended office hours/tutorials that were offered by my teacher
38 (31.7%)	My teacher sent me emails with information about assignments
30 (25%)	My teacher posted videos of someone else teaching the content
29 (24.2%)	We used Canvas
20 (16.7%)	My teacher assigned worksheets that I could print and complete and take a picture/submit
4 (3.3%)	We used SeeSaw

Middle School Data - P/S What Made DL Difficult?

Responses	What made Distance Learning Challenging?
91 (72.8%)	Not being able to interact with my Teacher
80 (64%)	Not being able to interact with my Schoolmates
79 (63.2%)	I was not sure what I was supposed to do
59 (47.2%)	Staying on task while I was on the computer
44 (35.2%)	I needed more help
39 (31.2%)	Not having a schedule and someone encouraging me
35 (28%)	The time it took me to finish work
30 (24%)	Too much work
23 (18.4%)	Participating in sports, clubs, or other activities
21 (16.8%)	Too little work
12 (9.6%)	Students telling lies, being disruptive
11 (8.8%)	Nothing was challenging for me
7 (5.6%)	I had other responsibilities that prevented me from getting my work done
2 (1.6%)	I didn't have a place to do my work

Middle School Data - Staff - What Worked with DL

Responses	Staff: Instructional activities most effective to deliver your distance learning curriculum?
19 (95%)	I used Google Classroom
18 (90%)	I used Zoom to meet with my students
18 (90%)	I sent emails to students or parents with information about the assignments I gave
15 (75%)	I set Office/Tutorial hours to meet with my students
15 (75%)	I gave my students feedback/comments on their online work
13 (65%)	Posted videos of myself teaching
9 (45%)	Posted videos that I found online of someone else teaching the content
9 (45%)	I used we-based tools like Flipgrid, Padlet, iReady, Imagine Learning, etc
7 (35%)	Posted worksheets that my students could complete online and submit to me
7 (35%)	Other
4 (20%)	Posted worksheets that my students could print and complete and take a picture/submit
3 (15%)	I used Canvas
1 (5%)	I used Class Dojo

Middle School Data - Staff - Biggest Challenges with the DL Format?

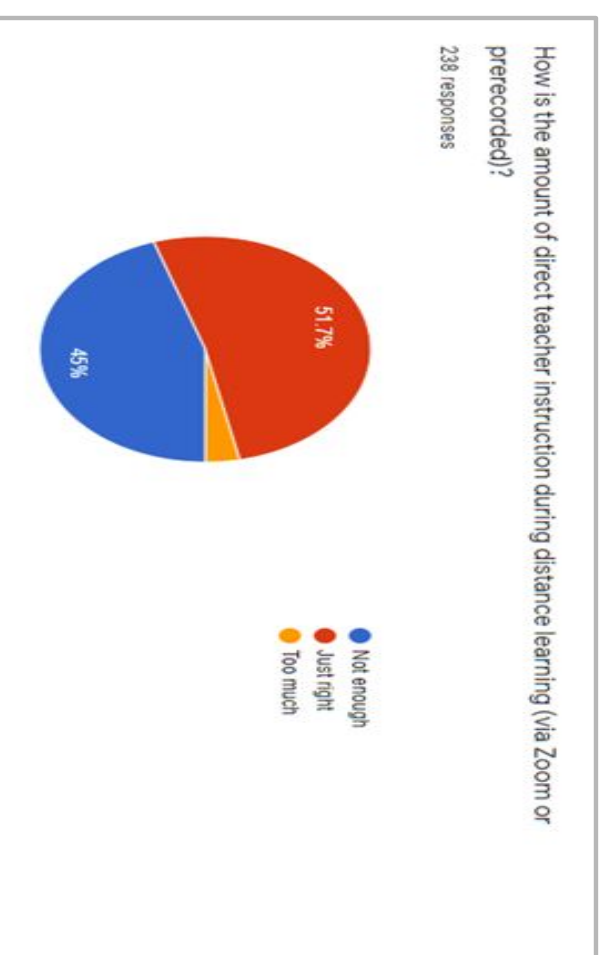
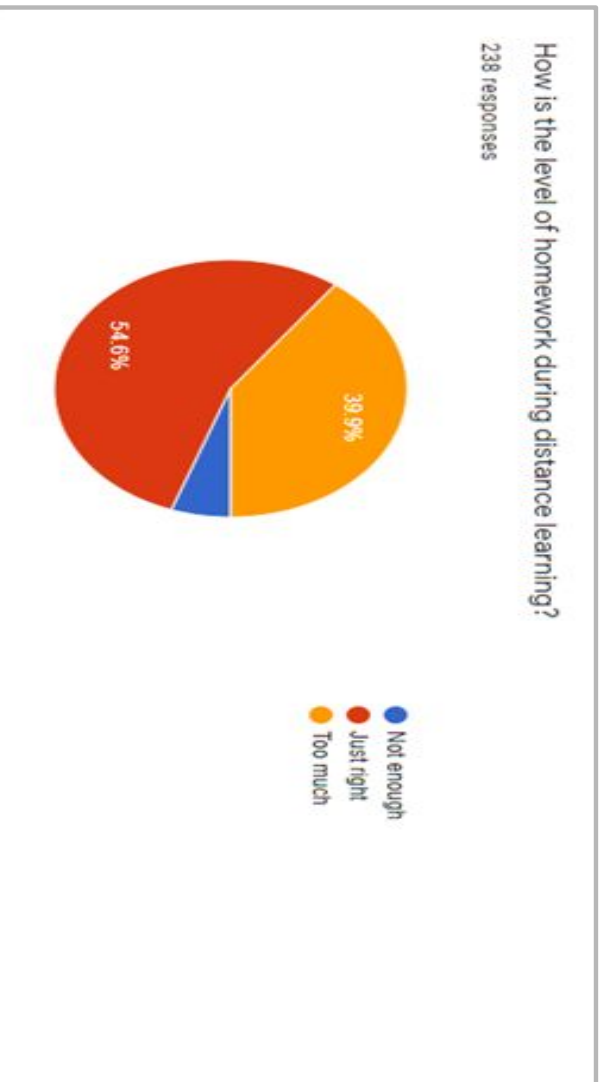
- Student engagement when no penalties for not doing work students talking/participating verbally in Zoom
- Attendance and work completion. The students understood that their lack of participation in any form - meetings or assignments - would not negatively impact their grade and so many just did not participate at all.
- Students who chose not participate or claimed that they could not access the materials
- Some students fell through the cracks and did not participate. I missed the social collaboration between students and my students learning suffered because of this loss. I am also still not happy with how to give tests remotely.
- Zoom meetings, trying to work from home with not enough space

Middle School Data - Staff - What were the challenges for our students?

- Time management. Many mentioned needing to keep a calendar to keep track of assignments and meetings.
- Not having the in class, hands on setting to foster social learning and be held accountable for the material.
- Staying motivated and on task (the self-disciplining was hard for so many with so many distractions online and /or at home, especially knowing no real consequences for not doing work
- Motivation and lack of grades x several responses
- Social-Emotional well-being and mental health for our students was a common theme when I had contact with families and students. A lot of students couldn't keep up and were not motivated due to the grading situation.
- Lack of social time, lack of peer input, lack of one-on-one help, lack of schedule

High School Data: What kids say...

"What things would be more helpful in your distance learning experience?"

- If teachers would get onto one platform, it would be easier to not have to go onto 3 different websites daily at least to find what I must do
- All the teachers using Google Classroom and having the reminders
- More flexibility & less big projects
- More student-teacher communications
- More zooms for teachers to allow students to ask questions and learn through their explanations

High School Data: What kids say...

"What things are not as helpful in your distance learning experience?"

- The amount of work it's already hard to stay motivated it kinda feels like everything is being piled on
- Long lectures in Zoom or Google Meets are not as helpful as prerecorded messages or extra resources given on Google Classroom
- College classes online schedule's sometimes collide with LJHS classes
- How some teachers give optional zoom meetings (Which I want to attend) at times when I have a mandatory class so I can't go to both
- When teachers ask you to upload things onto google classroom that may take a lot of storage- like a 2 min video. Not all computers or iPhone have enough free storage to upload a file of that size
